Dwight Twilley has a lot of material hitting the market this year. First, there's a disc containing two re-released solo albums -1982's "Scuba Divers" and 1979's "Twilley" — and there's a new live CD taken from two nights last vear at the Venue in Tulsa. The CD, called "Dwight Twilley

This collection of works by the Italian artist Paolo Gabrielli has been on display at the Tulsa Artists' Coalition gallery, 9 E. Brady St., for a few weeks now, and it closes on Saturday. "Just as the complete pieces are unique, each piece of the assembled object is unique," Gabrielli said.
